Required Organizational Practice: Home Safety Risk Assessment

WHAT IS A HOME SAFETY RISK ASSESSMENT?

- A Home Safety Risk Assessment is conducted for clients receiving services in their home.
- The assessment aims to promote safety for everyone involved—clients, families, and care team members.
- Information from the assessment is used for care planning and encourages open communication to manage identified hazards.

AT HEALTH PEI:

- A Home Safety Risk Assessment is completed for every client at the beginning of home care services.
- The assessment includes a review of health conditions that need special precautions, client risk factors, emergency preparedness, and chemical, biological, fire and fall hazards.
- Clients and families are informed of safety concerns identified during the assessment so they can take steps to reduce risk and support safer care.
- The Home Care Quality Improvement Team (QIT) audits Home Safety Risk Assessments to improve services and enhance safety.
